

Did You Know?

- The Tar Heel State has ranked first in Site Selection's annual business climate ranking for eight of the past nine years.
- Krispy Kreme Doughnuts were first made and sold in a Winston-Salem shop in 1937, and Pepsi was invented and first served in New Bern in 1898. The Pepsi-Cola Co. was incorporated in 1902.
- North Carolina has the largest state-maintained highway system in the United States. The state's highway system currently has 77,400 miles of roads.
- The state provides a tax credit of 35 percent of the cost of renewable energy property up to \$2.5 million for all solar, wind, hydro and biomass applications on commercial and industrial facilities.

Legislative Update

- North Carolina's Job
 Development Investment Grant
 (JDIG) program a key business
 attraction tool was set to
 expire in January 2010, but it
 has been extended for six more
 vears.
- The Industrial Development
 Fund, a job creation tool for
 economically distressed
 counties, has been expanded
 beyond Tier 1 counties the
 most distressed to include Tier
 2 counties. This means that 80
 of the state's 100 counties are
 now eligible to receive funding.
 Additionally, the grant cap per
 job has been increased from
 \$5,000 to \$10,000.
- Senate Bill 943 allows production companies a 25-percent tax credit for film projects in North Carolina, up from the previous credit of 15 percent. It also sets minimum spending and hiring requirements for qualifying film companies working in the state. Companies must spend a minimum of \$250,000 on

The film industry spent \$91 million in the state in 2008. The industry employs more than 2,500 statewide.





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
