



Legislative Update

- In January, Gov. Bev Perdue issued an executive order that brought North Carolina in line with a federal tailoring rule that exempts smaller companies from stricter greenhouse gas emissions requirements.
- Perdue repeatedly butted heads with a Republican-led legislature in 2011 over such issues as higher education budget cutting, unemployment taxes, merger of rural community colleges and state economic development funding. In June she vetoed a General Assembly budget that cut drastically from educational and other funds. The General Assembly in July overrode six Perdue vetoes, putting into action the "Energy Jobs Act," which will direct efforts toward more fossil fuel exploration.
- One of the measures, S532 ESC/Jobs Reform, had been vetoed because Perdue said it made changes to state unemployment law that could violate U.S. Dept. of Labor laws. In October, the chairman of the Employment Security Commission had to suspend enforcement of that measure's provisions for precisely that reason. Also in October, strife between the two sides came to a head after the state "lost" "Project Soccer," a \$500-million Continental Tire-Americas plant, to South Carolina
- Tort reform and workers' comp reform measures were signed into law, with medical malpractice reform waiting for further action in 2012.

Did You Know?

- The One North Carolina Fund provides financial assistance, through local governments that match its grants, to attract business projects. As of early October 2011, through the use of the One North Carolina Fund, more than 50,000 jobs and \$9 billion in investments had been created since 2001.
- Once a testing lab set up specifically for the hosiery and textile industry, the Manufacturing Solutions Center (MSC) in the City of Conover helps budding entrepreneurs and inventors from across the nation develop prototypes and commercialize their products. Driven by growing demand for its services, it's moving to a larger site that will open in early 2012.
- Ninety-eight of the state's 100 counties saw increases in visitor spending in 2010, including 13 that had double-digit increases.
