Legislative Update

- West Virginia's 0.1-percent business franchise tax (or capital stock tax) is expected to phase out fully in 2015. The corporate rate completed its phase-down schedule in 2014, having been reduced from 8.5 percent in 2011 to 6.5 percent.
- Gov. Tomblin in July announced West Virginia employers will see a

projected \$32 million in workers' compensation premium reductions in the coming year, and have seen a savings of more than \$280 million since the program was privatized in 2005.

- \bullet The state's minimum wage went from \$7.25 an hour to \$8 on Jan.
- 1, 2015, and will go sto \$8.75 the following year.
