

2015 GDP (in millions of current US\$) \$149,641 Gov. Brownback in June called for a special legislative session to address "threats by the Kansas Supreme Court to close Kansas schools." He signed into law a substitute measure later that month that ensured the schools remained open for the 2016-17 school year.

 That same month, the legislature overrode Brownback's veto of a taxpayer due process bill that clarified a 2014 taxpayer rights law by making it clear that aggrieved taxpayers can appeal to district court an adverse ruling by the Board of Tax Appeals and receive a full evidentiary hearing.

Did You Know?

The Contributions of Immigrants in Kansas, an August 2016 report that's part of the Reason for Reform campaign from the Partnership for a New American Economy, showed that immigrants make up 7 percent of the state's population and contributed \$1.4 billion in taxes, or close to 7 percent of the total share, in 2014. That same year, immigrants earned \$5.2 billion, or 6.7 percent of all income earned by Kansans in 2014.

The annual Kansas Chamber Business Leaders Poll, released in January 2016, found that 75 percent of Kansas business owners said lowering the tax burden and managing the cost of healthcare are two of the most important things government can do to help profitability and investment. "Although only 28 percent of respondents would consider leaving Kansas, taxes are the top reason a business would consider moving elsewhere," said the Chamber.


