



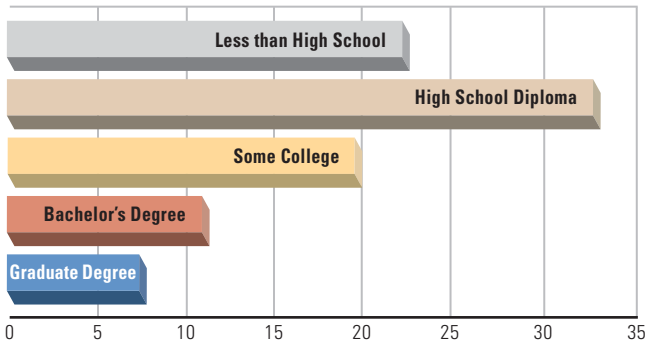

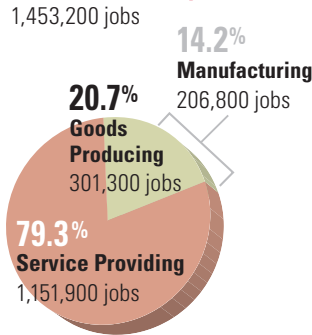

Did You Know?

- Kentucky ranks 3rd among all states in light vehicle production. Nearly 10 percent of all cars and trucks produced in the U.S. are made in Kentucky.
- Kentucky's business tax climate ranking rose faster than any other

state, up 14 spots to 20th in The Tax Foundation's 2010 State Business Tax Climate Index.

- Kentucky has 2,500 miles of railroad and 1,100 miles of commercially navigable waterways.

Legislative Update

• The Incentives for a New Kentucky bill streamlines and modernizes Kentucky's business incentive programs — including the consolidation of four long-standing programs, Kentucky Rural Economic Development Act, Kentucky Industrial Development Act, Kentucky Jobs Development Act, and Kentucky Economic Opportunity Zone Act — into a single, more flexible tax incentive program called the Kentucky Business Investment (KBI) Program. KBI provides income tax credits and wage assessments to new and existing agribusinesses, regional and national headquarters, manufacturing companies, and non-retail service or technology related companies that locate or expand operations in Kentucky. Increased incentives are available to projects occurring in enhanced incentive counties. The new legislation also expands the Kentucky Enterprise Initiative Act (KEIA) to include a sales tax refund for the purchase of electronic processing equipment costing \$50,000 or more in addition to the minimum \$500,000 project investment. The term of the agreement for KEIA projects has been extended for up to seven years.
