




Legislative Update

- Gov. Robert Bentley announced the creation of the Alabama Economic Development Alliance, charged with more effectively utilizing the job creation and workforce assets of the state and creating a statewide economic development strategic plan.
- •The Full Employment Act of 2011 was passed, aimed at helping small businesses hire employees. It provides a one-time tax credit to small businesses who hire additional employees. Businesses with 50 or fewer

employees will receive a one-time income tax credit equal to \$1,000 per new job paying more than \$10 per hour. The Full Employment Act of 2011 is an enhanced version of the Reemployment Act of 2010.

• A law was passed providing small businesses with fewer than 25 employees a tax deduction in order to provide health insurance. The law allows qualifying employers and employees to deduct an additional 50 percent of the amount expended for health insurance premiums.
