

Legislative Update

- In September, the U.S. Dept. of the Treasury and Gov. Paul LePage announced the approval of Maine's State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) application. The funds will help spur more than \$132 million in additional small-business lending in the state.
- In June, the governor signed a biennial budget that rincludes tax reform which provides \$150 million in tax relief, including a reduction in Maine's
- top income tax rate from 8.5 percent to 7.95 percent that is expected to eliminate tax payments for 70,000 low-income Mainers.
- Legislative Document No. 1 includes measures to assist job creators, such as changes to the Bureau of Environmental Protection, the establishment of an environmental audit program and the creation of a new business liaison program.
