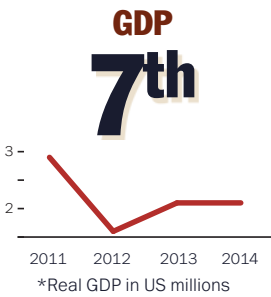

Legislative Update

- From the Ohio Economic Developers Association: The \$71.2-billion state budget included the extension of the Enterprise Zone Program until 2017, a net income tax cut of \$1.9 billion over two years for individuals and small businesses, and a tax cut across all brackets by 6.3 percent. The final bill restores the Third Frontier Internship Program for Fiscal Years 2016-2017 and extends the Enterprise Zone Program through October 2017.
- The Incumbent Workforce Training Voucher Program was rolled out in CY 2013 to reimburse Ohio employers’ costs to train their existing workers. The initiative was funded by one-time revenue from casino license fees totaling \$50 million. The program is appropriated \$7.5 million in each fiscal year of the FY 2016-FY 2017 biennium under the executive proposal. Once distributed, this will exhaust the funding from the casino license revenue.

Greater Cincinnati ranked in the Top Five Most Competitive Cities in North America in five industry sectors – Aerospace, Food & Beverage, Chemicals & Plastics, Transportation and Metals – according to Site Selection’s recently released 2015 World’s Most Competitive Cities report.

Six countries comprise three quarters of international companies’ total investment in Ohio, according to a July 2015 report from the Ohio Research Office: Japan (29 percent), United Kingdom (15 percent), Germany (12 percent), Canada (10 percent), France (7 percent) and Switzerland (5 percent).

Rickenbacker International Airport in Columbus is a critical logistics component of Rickenbacker Inland Port, which includes an intermodal terminal, industrial development and a Foreign-Trade Zone. The inland port is within a 10-hour truck drive to 47 percent of the US population, 44 percent of the manufacturing capacity and 48 percent of US headquarters operations.
