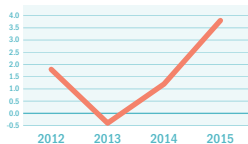

## Legislative Update

- Gov. Charlie Baker in August signed into law comprehensive economic development legislation providing up to \$1 billion in new investments in communities, workforce training, and innovation. The package provides new capital funding for local infrastructure (\$500 million), brownfields site cleanup (\$45 million), Gateway Cities development (\$45 million), site assembly and site readiness (\$15 million), workforce development (\$45 million) and emerging manufacturing technologies (\$71 million in matching grant funds).
- The legislation also includes digital healthcare cluster development and an angel investor tax credit, and streamlines the state’s Economic Development Incentive Program by “strengthening the link between the issuance of tax credits, and job creation that would not otherwise occur” and adding “flexibility to the incentive program by eliminating obsolete, formula-driven incentive categories.”
