
**GDP Growth Rate Trend**

## **Legislative Update**

- An act authorized the Department of Taxes to award \$50 million and the Agency of Commerce and Community Development to award \$20 million in emergency economic recovery grants.
- A new measure authorized the Agency of Commerce and Community Development to transfer funds appropriated for tourism to the new remote worker and new relocating worker programs.
- An act authorizes the Town of Hartford to extend the period it can incur indebtedness for its tax increment financing district until March 31, 2021.
- Gov. Scott vetoed S.23, a bill that would have mandated an increase to Vermont's minimum wage on top of increases that already occur annually under current Vermont law. "Despite S.23's good intentions, the reality is there are too many unintended consequences and we cannot grow the economy or make Vermont more affordable by arbitrarily forcing wage increases," Scott said. "I believe this legislation would end up hurting the very people it aims to help."
