

GDP Growth Rate Trend



LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The state's the Fiscal Committee voted in December to approve \$65 million for the Broadband Connect Program, which will connect tens of thousands of additional locations to high-speed internet. "This funding will help ensure the Granite State remains competitive in retaining and attracting workforce, business, residents, and telehealth opportunities into the future," said Gov. Sununu. The funding followed \$50 million approved earlier in the year, which is slated to provide high speed broadband service to an additional 23,000 locations.

The Joint Legislative Fiscal Committee voted in April to approve Governor Chris Sununu's \$100M InvestNH Housing Fund, designed to increase affordable rental units in place for lower-and middle-income workers. The same committee also voted to accept and expend a \$2.6 million ARPA-funded expansion of the Community College System of New Hampshire (CCSNH) licensed practical nurse (LPN) training program, doubling its programming.
