LEGISLATIVE & POLICY UPDATE

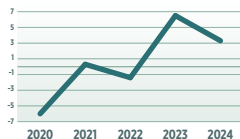
Beginning on July 1, 2025, the state of Alaska began a multi-stage approach to raising the minimum wage, starting at \$13 hourly in 2025, \$14 in 2026 and \$15 in 2027. A mandatory paid sick leave law also took effect last year, requiring employers to provide one hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked.

The Alaska Native Village Municipal Lands Restoration Act of 2025, signed into law on July 9 by President Trump, will allow for the return of 11,500 acres from the state to Alaska Native corporations. The Alaska Native Regional Corporations are regional corporations that administer and settle land and financial claims made by the Alaska Natives.

House Bill 69 boosts base education funding per student by \$1,000. A special session in August was called for 30 days by Gov. Dunleavy, with the original focus being education reform and creating a new state Agriculture Department. The session concluded in a stalemate as lawmakers overrode the governor’s vetoes, reinstalling \$50 million in state funding for public schools and strengthening the authority of the legislative auditor.

LEGISLATIVE & POLICY UPDATE

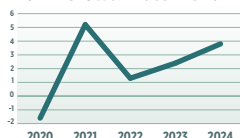
The Arkansas Department of Education was directed to develop a “one-stop-shop” job-seeking app for teaching positions. In partnership with Nimble, the Statewide Education Job Board is set to launch in early 2026. In early 2025, Gov. Sanders launched “Arkansas LAUNCH,” a more general job-seeking platform for employment across the state. “LAUNCH unlocks visibility of employment for job seekers. Its design is based off of skills matching to career,” said Arkansas Chief Workforce Officer Mike Rogers about the platform. “Anyone looking for the right sized occupation and training to increase capability, can find it on LAUNCH. Employers are able to invite qualified candidates to apply. Arkansas knows that skills competency is the currency that employers value.”

Senate Bill 420 was passed in April 2025, expanding eligibility for water development programs as well as amending the water authority act and the uses of the construction assistance revolving loan fund.

House Bill 1935 became effective on October 1, creating a tax credit to promote significant capital investment by existing Arkansas businesses, especially in modernization and automation. Projects must meet a minimum investment requirement of \$25 million to qualify for the credit.
